A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT...



I don't know about you, but I can hardly believe it's March! Perhaps it's because of the predominately mild winter, but it surely feels as though this year is moving by quickly.

At the beginning of March, we held a mid-year inservice day for all staff. This training involved discussions about several events happening in the life of Warwick that are influencing our future. You have read about many of them in our newsletters and on our website.

They are:

- Our comprehensive plan 3-year rewrite
- The feasibility study of our facilities, enrollment trends and related planning for the future
- The implementation of more specific planning for college and career readiness for all students
- A focus on innovation using 21st Century learning skills: (4 C's) communication, collaboration, critical thinking and creativity

So with these four things happening simultaneously, we decided as a district to stop and take some time to identify what all of this means for Warwick. Our vision statement, "Knowledge, Skills, Values" captures a big picture look at what we want to impart to our students. But these four events have caused us to look deeper and ask some questions like:

- What do today's graduates need to be successful?
- What are employers looking for in a graduate?
- What skills do students who are headed to post secondary education need?
- What does, and what should a Warwick graduate look like?
- How do we translate Knowledge, Skills, Values to what we are actually doing with and for our students?

These are all great questions. What we do know, is that while standardized testing information is important and can be helpful in identifying content needs, it certainly doesn't tell us enough. We also know that we are doing a terrific job at delivering content, and we will continue to do so. We put the teaching of our content under the "Knowledge" umbrella of our vision statement.

We have also focused a great deal of attention and time to meeting our students' emotional needs, providing resources for mental health, examining our own life experiences, learning about trauma and finding ways to provide additional resources to families. One of those events is a screening of the movie Resilience. You can read more about our Resilience event coming up on March 23rd on page 3. We are grateful to the Warwick Education Foundation for sponsoring this event. We will continue to learn and grow in this area, which we put under the "Values" umbrella.

Based on our comprehensive planning, the focus on college and career readiness, what we have seen and learned about innovation, and ensuring that our facilities have what we need in order to prepare our students for the 21st Century, we have begun to focus on those 4 C's which fit under the "Skills" umbrella.

Our staff spent the inservice day collaborating across grade levels and subject areas identifying what they need to teach these skills in their classrooms, as well as identifying what they believe the characteristics of a Warwick graduate should be. The day provided us with excellent feedback and direction.

We are looking for your feedback and direction as well, specifically for our feasibility study. Warwick will host a public focus group on Monday, April 24 at 6:30 PM in the middle school auditorium. We welcome and encourage your participation.

You are Invited to Attend: "Resilience" - the Biology of Stress & the Science of Hope

Warwick School District invites our parents and members of the Warwick school community to attend an important, free evening event entitled, "Resilience" on Thursday, March 23, 2017 at 6:30 PM in the Warwick Middle School Auditorium. This program is funded through the generosity of the Warwick Education Foundation and brings attention to the emerging science of childhood stress and adversity.

WSD will be showing a video called, "Resilience - the Biology of Stress & the Science of Hope". The video is a one-hour documentary that chronicles the birth of a new movement among pediatricians, therapists, educators, and communities who are using cutting-edge brain science to disrupt cycles of violence, addiction and disease. Warwick will also have a panel discussion afterwards that includes experts in this field and also students who have faced adversity will give testimonials to

how intervention and support can help to bring about change.

Here is a statement taken from the video: "High "doses" of stress during childhood get into our bodies, change our brains, and lead to lifelong health and social problems—everything from domestic violence and substance abuse to heart disease and cancer. Who knew that if your parents got a divorce when you were growing up, you have a significantly higher risk of heart disease? Or that if your mother had a drinking problem, your own risk for depression in adulthood is much higher? The science of "Toxic Stress" and the major findings that came out of the Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) Study should be common knowledge public health information. But the movement is still in its infancy. We started making RESILIENCE to make this science digestible and relevant to everyone, and to



showcase some of the brave and creative individuals who are putting that science into action. There is a growing group of pediatricians, educators and communities who are proving that cycles of disease and adversity can be broken."

Warwick School District and the Warwick Education Foundation are excited to share this program and its powerful message with our community.

Congratulations to the 2017 Warwick Middle School Future City Team for placing fourth in the National Future City Competition in Washington D.C. In addition to being selected as one of the top five teams in the Nation, Warwick's team also received the award for Best Use of Aerospace Engineering and Best Fire Protection Engineering.

Upon being named one of the top five teams in the competition, the WMS Future City Team had to

present one last time to determine the order of their team's placement. Warwick finished with an Honorable Mention, taking fourth place.

While Warwick Middle School Future City team has been named regional champions for four straight years, this is the best final placement upon their advancement to National competition. Congratulations, team!

The 2017 Warwick High School Science Fair was held on Thursday, March 9 in the school's small gymnasium with more than 80 students participating in 10 different science categories, including: biochemistry, botany, inorganic chemistry, organic chemistry, earth and environmental science, engineering, health & medicine, microbiology, physics, & zoology.

The fair is held annually and gives science students the opportunity to present and explain their individual projects and research to staff and students, their families, and the community. Students use cardboard tabletop displays containing drawings, photos, charts, graphs, and research information to showcase their projects. The unique displays are lined up in rows that stretch from one end of the high school small gym to the other by their scientific category. Students dress professionally; explain their project research



and outcome, and answer questions posed to them by members of the local science community and various district staff members who serve as judges.

Although the competition is open to all students, the science fair projects are a requirement for Warwick High School's Advanced Chemistry classes, taught by Mrs. Laurie Hess. These student projects are the culmination of many months of data gathering, lab work, charting, research, and reporting. Most students are either juniors or sophomores.

Displays were open in the evening to the general public for viewing on March 9, 2017.


Science fair participants and winners were honored with certificates and monetary awards for their efforts on Friday, March 10 in the high school auditorium.

Warwick Middle School's Student Council recently sponsored a volleyball tournament to raise money for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. Two rounds of games were held - one for seventh grade teams, and one for eighth grade teams. The competition was intense, and many teams showed their spirit by creating unique team uniforms. The top team from each grade then battled each other in a championship game held on March 1, 2017. The eighth graders were victorious. The winning team had a

great incentive - they got to cut Assistant Principal Mrs. Michelle
Harris's hair in front of the rest of the student body on

March 6! The winning team (all boys) opted to watch from the sidelines and handed the hair cutting responsibilities over to the second place winners (all seventh grade girls). The girls had instructions to cut Mrs. Harris's hair directly above the rubber band guides that were holding her hair in sections around her head. The pony tails were put into place prior to the cutting by Stephanie Bollinger, owner of Classic Images Salon who will now submit the severed sections to Pantene Beautiful Lengths (they require 8" lengths for donation) a charity that makes wigs for people fighting cancer. All together, the WMS Student Council raised \$352.25 to help children battling cancer.
